The Chairs' Corner

27 October 2004

As I sit here on a hectic day dealing with deadlines, I sometimes wonder how I get it all done. Looking back over the last two years as your Chairman, I see that we have accomplished many things.

Here is just a partial list of Central Indiana Section Accomplishments over the last two years.

- The Central Indiana Section has received the Region 4 award for "Exemplary Section 2003" Enough said.
- Hosted the Electro/Information Technology conference sponsored by Region 4. This was the first conference hosted by the section in recent history. This took place on June 4-6, 2003 at the Holiday Inn Select at the Indianapolis International Airport. Tracks included the traditional paper track and for the first time in the history of the conference a professional development/leadership track.
- Increased attendance at the section executive committee meetings of non committee members. Over the past two years there has been an increase in non executive committee members showing up to the executive committee meetings. This is fantastic and highly important. We always need volunteers to help fill positions. While not everyone that shows up takes on a position, we gladly accept their input. The executive committee meetings of the section are open to all section members and occur usually on the fourth Thursday of the month.
- Increase in the number of chapter chairs taking part in executive committee meetings. Over the past two years we have increased the number of chapter chairs that attend the section executive committee meetings. This is significant in that communication between the chapters and the section is improving. The chapter chairs attendance allows the section to learn more about the chapter and their needs, and be available to provide assistance when needed. The chapter chairs also get first hand knowledge about what is going on in the section and can relay that information to their society members.
- Increase in the number of joint section/chapter events. It has been a goal to have a joint section/chapter event with each chapter. This can be in any form, e.g. a tour, distinguished speaker, etc... The goal of a joint section/chapter event is to share knowledge of a society with other members of the section that are not members of that society but are interested in the topic being presented.
- The Central Indiana Engineering Consultant's Network (CIECN) This is the newest affinity group in the section. This group meets once a month and is a way for CIS members to network. See <http://www.indy-engineer.net/> for more information.

As with successes there are also areas that need to be worked on. Some of these are:

- Interacting with student chapters. There are four student branch chapters within the Central Indiana Section. But over the past two years we have not had much contact with them. It is crucial to have a student chapter liaison and contact with the student chapters. It is the current students who will become the future engineers. If the student engineers can get to know the IEEE as a professional organization that can give back to them not only as a student but also as an engineer, who is new to the workforce, then the number of young engineers in IEEE will increase. The Graduates of the Last Decade (GOLD) is designed to help new engineers (ten or less years in the workforce after the first professional degree) to acclimate into the workforce.

- Finding and maintaining volunteers.
The IEEE is an all volunteer organization. We have a section population of approximately 1,700 members. Out of this we have a core Executive Committee made up of seven voting members. Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, two Directors and the Communications officer. We have four active societies whose chairmen are also members of the executive committee: Power Engineering/Industrial Applications Society, Computer Society, Engineering in Medicine and Biology Society and Signal Processing Society. We also have a Professional Activities Committee (PACE), Newsletter Editor, Membership Development, and Student Chapter Liaison. So, if all positions were filled, we could have a total of 15 executive committee members out of a possible 1,700 members or approximately 1% of the total membership. The Central Indiana Section and the IEEE work because of volunteers.

Please join us for the next meeting of the Central Indiana Engineering Consultants' Network www.indy-engineer.net which will be held on Thursday, November 4th, from 6:45 PM to 8:30 PM at the IUPUI Business/SPEA Building at 801 W. Parking will be available in the North Street Garage (XC) which is just north of the SPEA Building across Michigan Street. There are usually two meetings a year (January and October) where section chairs of region 4 attend the region 4 executive committee meeting. While there, many events happen. An update on the region is given by various department heads or the region 4 executive committee to the section chairs. The section chairs also give reports on their section. Other activities include:

- Voting on the region budget
- Voting on who will become Director – Elect
- Training on how to do different jobs, interact with IEEE corporate in Picatscaway, NJ
- Training on Professional Activities
- Updates on the Region 4 Sponsored conference (Electro/Information Technology)

Just so you know, we take the section awards winners (Member of the Year and Engineer of the year) and submit them for the region 4 equivalent award. However, the rules state that we cannot be Exemplary Section two years in a row.

Next year there will only be one region 4 executive committee meeting. This will take place in October 2005 in conjunction with Sections Congress. Sections Congress occurs every three years and has delegates from every section in the world from all ten regions. This is a very big international IEEE conference. This Sections Congress will be held in Tampa, Florida.

IEEE Organizing Global Pre-College Technology Education Program

Continuing in its tradition of innovation, IEEE is taking the lead in developing a new non-discriminatory global pre-college technology education program. The program titled, emeritbadges.org, will be directed globally towards pre-college boys and girls.

[Emeritbadges.org](http://emeritbadges.org) has developed hands-on electricity and electronics instructional material based on the Boy Scouts merit badge requirements. Instructional material for computer education is being developed. Any student, boy or girl can use the program to enhance technical literacy and learn more about viable engineering and other technical career options.

[Emeritbadges.org](http://emeritbadges.org) Project Director Ralph W. Russell, II from the IEEE Richmond, VA Section said that this non-discriminatory program would be promoted globally through IEEE and youth programs such as World Organization of the Scout Movement and The World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts. The next use of the new global pre-college electronics education material and hands-on kit will be at the 2005 National Scout Jamboree in Caroline County, VA, USA. Over 35,000 scouts will attend the Jamboree from the USA and several other countries.

Project leaders have started discussions with national and regional Girl Scout leaders to develop a method of incorporating the emeritbadges.org program into the Girl Scout program. The next step will be to start discussions with the global World Organization of the Scout Movement and The World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts.

The 2005 Jamboree will be held at Fort A. P. Hill in Caroline, Virginia. The Jamboree will start on Monday, 25 July 2005 and end on Wednesday, 3 August 2005. Hundreds of volunteers that can serve as Assistant Instructors at the Jamboree Electronics Merit Badge booth for at least two days are needed. Broadband Internet over Power Line

Broadband over Power Lines (BPL) has emerged as an exciting development in communications. This technology uses the existing electricity distribution infrastructure to provide broadband access to homes and businesses. Cinergy started a venture this spring to provide BPL service to its customers in the Cincinnati area. Jim Mollenkopf from Current Technologies, the manufacturer of the equipment used in the new Cinergy venture, will address key facets of this technology, including an overview of the powerline communications channel and how channel impairments are mitigated. Network architecture and performance tradeoffs will be discussed, as well as how this technology integrates with power system operations.

Tour of the Anderson Peaking Power Plant Well Received

The joint meeting between the Section and PES/IAS on September 14, was a tour of the IMPA peaking power plant in Anderson, Indiana. Thirty people attended.

The 80,000 kilowatt combustion turbin peaker was added in 2004. The two 40,000 kilowatt peakers were installed in 1993. IMPA (Indiana Municipal Power Agency) also constructed a 138 kv line about 6 miles to Anderson's Webster Street Substation where Anderson Municipal Light and Power constructed a new 138 kv to 34.5 x 69 kv substation. The "x 69" indicates that it can be reconnected to a 69 kv secondary in the future. Attendees were able to see the peakers, discuss their operation with the plant operators, and talk about the construction of the single steel pole line and the construction practices used.

After the tour, most of the attendees chose to participate in the planned dinner as a group at the Edgewood Country Club, as well. Everyone had a pleasant time of learning from some well qualified people and enjoyed some great fellowship with section members.

IEEE-USA BACKS CENTER TO PROVIDE CONGRESS WITH TECHNOLOGICAL EXPERTISE

IEEE-USA has joined a coalition of engineering societies in supporting a bipartisan bill recently introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives that would establish a Center for Scientific and Technical Assessment (CTSA) to provide Congress with technological expertise.

In a letter sent on 6 October to Rep. Rush Holt (D-N.J.) and Rep. Amo Houghton (R-N.Y.), IEEE-USA and its sister organizations wrote: "The sheer volume and complexity of the technological data facing federal legislators necessitate some mechanism for balanced, non-partisan and technologically informed analysis provided in a judicious manner."

IEEE-USA joined a coalition which included AAES, ASCE, ASHRAE, NSPE and the Optical Society of America.
